**AV Walks championships posted on WA calendar

After several weeks of negotiations with World Athletics and Athletics Australia, we are happy to report that our Championship events will be advertised on the World Athletics calendar, starting with the Jared Tallent 35km trophy on Sunday 15 May and including the AV 15km championships on Saturday 22 June.

This is good news for the VRWC, as we conduct all State winter championships on behalf of AV, and the hosting of WA-badged events can only raise the profile of the sport locally and even attract interest from further afield. The big selling point for our races now is that the results will be processed by WA and included in athletes' profiles, world top lists and rankings.

Club secretary **Terry Swan**, who has done the legwork to bring this about, has posted the following notice on our Facebook page:

VRWC now has approval to conduct events that have World Athletics Certification. Results from these events will be published on the World Athletics website, alongside athlete profiles. Results will be included in World Top Lists and world rankings. These events will sanctioned for qualification purposes. We hope it will attract some interstate athletes and even some overseas athletes. VRWC is in a fortunate position in that we have 2 certified courses on which we can hold these competitions. VRWC athletes need to enter these events as normal, details for them will be published on our RevSport portal. It is an exciting time for VRWC.

Events offered will be 5km, 10km, 15km, 20km and 35km.



**VMA 30+ Gift 2024, Sunday 7 April - Doncaster

The 2nd edition of what looks likely to be (unless the money runs out) a permanent fixture on the Victorian Masters calendar, the VMA 30+ Gift was held on a humid and intermittently showery Sunday at the Tom Kelly track. With all events (organized on a handicap basis) offering prize money, athletes had an appetizing incentive to perform well. Notable, also, was the near-success of the Men's 4 X 800m relay team who came within 1-2secs of breaking the world record.

A small but keen field of walkers set off at intervals, based on handicaps, to vie for the 2000m Walk purse. **Gwen Steed**, the outmarker, was hauled back in only in the final half-lap with all seven walkers finishing within 40secs of each other ... good handicapping. **Heather Carr** looked likely to take the \$200 first prize win until **Kevin Cassidy** strode past in the final 50m. **Mark Thomas** had the fastest time on the day, those three leaving the venue a little richer for their efforts.

**** WALKER OF THE WEEK ****

It's a retrospective WOTW this week, for an achievement from two weeks ago – and what an achievement! World U20 Teams Walk rep **Isaac Beacroft** has added another of these honorary gongs to his growing list on the strength of his State Best Performance on record of **5:18.66** in winning the Little Athletics NSW U17 1500m title. A performance such as this from one so young simply beggars belief and might well attract scepticism among many who've never seen Isaac in action, observing the fluency and efficiency of his technique.

World 1500m Race walk records are not recognized, although there are no doubt statisticians out there who keep tabs on improved marks as best they can. Indeed, QLD coach Robyn Wales was of the view that, on the same night that Isaac posted his amazing time, Bailey Housden set a 1500m mark in the LAQ championships that may well have been a world best for his age until Isaac's eclipsed it. What a contest between two of Australia's brightest young prospects!

Well done, Isaac. We will be watching your races in Adelaide and Antalya with high hopes for great results for you in both.

- Nate Appleyard (NSW) like Isaac, Nate set a new LANSW Best Performance with his time of **4:59.00** in the U11 1100m walk.
- Sophie Polkinghorne and Maisie Mitchell (NSW) both went sub-6:40 in winning their LANSW age group titles, in 6:38.84 and 6:39.92 respectively.



*AUSTRALIAN T&F CHAMPIONSHIPS COMMENCE THIS WEEK IN ADELAIDE Open & U20 10,000m Walks on Thursday 11 April – Junior races next week

The race walking program of the **2024 AA Track & Field Championships** gets underway at Adelaide's Mile End stadium this coming Thursday. Judging by the quality in the entry lists, these races will be awaited with eagerness by walking fans across the country in a year of high national selection stakes.

Setting the ball rolling will be the Senior and U20 10,000m titles. The Senior men's race could see a repeat (almost said re-run!) of the AV 5000m championship with **Rhydian Cowley** and former champion **Kyle Swan** arm-wrestling for the title, but **Declan Tingay** is back from injury and a solid 1:20:00 20km in Taicang. With the Antalya (TUR) Mixed Relay just weeks away, the West Australian will be out to test his speed and the title will be fought out among this trio. **Tim Fraser** and **Will Thompson** are the ones most likely to swoop should any of the top three falter.

With Bec Henderson not entered, **Jemima Montag** has a lock on the Senior womens's title if all goes well, especially as she, too, will be using this race as a proving ground for the Antalya relay. **Hannah Mison** and **Allanah Pitcher** look most likely to join Montag on the podium.

The U20 men's field promises the same contest of class we've come to expect from these lads in recent seasons, now spiced with **Isaac Beacroft** to change the dynamic. Up to now, nobody has had an answer to the young New South Welshman's acceleration from 2-3km out in any of his races since 2022, although **Bailey Housden** and **Marcus Wakim** have come closest. Expect these three, plus **Riley Coughlan, John Ronan** and **Owen Toyne**, to be locked in combat early, although Beacroft has to be considered the favourite. He, Wakim and Coughlan will wear green and gold in the U20 10km in Antalya, so this race shapes as an enticing preview of their form.

Alexandra Griffin and Zoe Woods – another pair of Antalya team-mates – should fight it out for the U20 women's title, with Nellie Langford (joining them on the plane to Turkiye), Sienna Pitcher and possibly Maddison Nash vying for the 3rd podium place.

Walking returns to Mile End next Tuesday, with the U17-18s doing battle over 5000m. The Boys U18 race is the most compelling with **Bailey Housden** starting favourite over **Owen Toyne** and **John Ronan** for podium honours.

Sienna Pitcher is a class above in the Girls U18 with a season best nearly 2 mins clear of her nearest rival Matilda Webb, who with Lyla Williams will likely make it a NSW medals trifecta.

The small Boys U17 field should produce another engaging contest. **Sam Lindsay** has been in red-hot form this summer and **Kodi Clarkson** can be counted on to push him hard all the way. Either could win. Meanwhile, the Girls U17 race should see a win for **Kaytee Bogaers** who is at least a minute ahead of **Milly Sharpe** on times and well clear of the rest.

Less than three hours after his U14 race, **Angus Shuttleworth** will be lining up with the U15s for another go. Fellow Vic **Max Davidson** has had some good contests with Angus this summer and will hold the edge once again. In the U15 Boys **Noah Cooke** looks way superior, with **Jaime Hvalica** and **Alexander Braendle** likely to fight it out for the placings.

The **Chemist Warehouse Australian Athletics Championships** will be broadcast for 8-hours per day on **7Plus**. The broadcast window is selected to include the maximum number of finals, and will be as per the schedule below.

Due to the complexities of a large 9-day championship with over 3600 athletes in action and multiple events in progress at any one time, not every event will be broadcast – the best way to watch is always by attending and watching live at the stadium. However, we encourage you to also download the Roster Athletics App on the app store of your choice, where live results will be posted including round by round field event trials.

Regrettably for walking fans, the scheduling of a number of walking events means they will either not be broadcast at all, or face partial cessation of coverage. The big losers are the Men's Senior/U20 10,000m and the Men's U18 5000m (both will finish too early for the broadcast start). In this case, the marquee walk event – the Men's 10,000m, whose field contains 3 current Olympians and four others with world Top 20 rankings – will not be seen by anyone who isn't trackside. Last year in Brisbane the same thing happened to the Women's 10,000m field (the camera was turned off as they lined up to start), so at least there's some equality there.

The NSW Little Athletics championships walks were, as always, keenly contested, with **Isaac Beacroft** providing the absolute highlight of the meeting, breaking his own State Best performance time with **5:18.66** to win the U17 1500m. 10yo **Nate Appleyard's 4:59.00** for 1100m was also a new State BP. **Sophie Polkinghorne, Maisie Mitchell, Gemma Dixon, Matilda Webb, Jessica Loring** and **Callum Martin** all set themselves up for strong 3000m performances in Adelaide next week with sub-7:00 wins over 1500m.

CZECHIA: WA Gold event: 92nd Podebrady Walking, 6 April - Podebrady

It appears that strong winds and unseasonally warm temperatures played havoc with the fortunes of many 20km walkers in Podebrady, CZE (26 DNF's in the men's race and 15 in the women's) and no doubt sending many finishers home with results less than hoped for with Antalya coming up. A temperature of 23°C may not seem too fierce to us, but coming off a European winter few would have been acclimatised to it. (Shades of the 2022 Fawkner Park 35km championship here in Melbourne ...)

It mattered little, however, to **Perseus Karlstrom (SWE)** and **Kimberly Garcia Leon (PER)** who, as Paul Warburton reports below, both raised the bar in taking strong wins.

Karlstrom and Garcia break meeting records in Podebrady

March winds were harsh on both Podebrady Walking winners, but April has brought pure joy. **Perseus Karlstrom** and **Kimberly Garcia** were forced to drop out of **World Athletics Race Walking Tour Gold** races last month, but bounced back to triumph in the Czech spa town east of Prague on Saturday (6).

Garcia took on a hot race in every sense of the word. The thermometer rose to 23°C in a 20km race that still provided a course record for the double world champion from Peru. In fact, the first three broke the previous mark set by **Antonella Palmisano** in 2021. This time, the Olympic gold medallist had to give way at 16km as Garcia went through the gears. It seemed for a moment the Italian was destined to take a consolation second place. But Ecuador's **Glenda Morejon** had other ideas, turning a two seconds disadvantage into a three-second lead going into the bell lap that decided the order. All three were comfortably under 1:28:00. Garcia's new Podebrady mark was a heartening **1:27:08**. Behind them were four PBs in the top 10 to belie conditions.

From the gun, 20-plus athletes went through the first kilometre in a comfortable 4:30, comfortable that is for the calibre of walker at the front.

By the end of the second lap, that throng was already thinning as the pace picked up. In fact, the leading nine had creviced open a small gap at 3km (13:16), with another significant group headed by France's **Clemence Beretta** right behind.

The pace had steadied by the next time round, but it still found past winner **Eleonora Giorgi** just about hanging on. The leaders were forced to go the long way round, right and left, when passing four lapped walkers stretched across the course. Even so, quarter distance was reached in 22:06, and the leaders were down to six although **Magaly Bonilla** from Ecuador was desperately trying to stay in touch.

It was Italy versus south and central America by lap eight (35:21) – and the rest playing catch-up, with double world silver medallist **Katarzyna Zdzieblo** back in 13th already 34 seconds behind, and Beretta passed by two teammates mixing it with a second group from South America.

At halfway in 44:06, Bonilla and Giorgi were again feeling the pace, especially with a last circuit of 4:21. The gloves were definitely off one lap later. The front four clocked 4:18, and that did for Giorgi, Bonilla and Brazilian **Viviane Lyra**. The next casualty was surprisingly **Alegna Gonzalez** from Mexico, with Garcia biding her time. That was because the pink-vested Morejon had already made a break for home, seven laps before the finish.

But the gap was a mere second, and Garcia underlined her class as she refused to give way. At three-quarters distance (65:39) it was 22 seconds to a distant Gonzalez walking solo, so barring disaster the podium was already filled. As the leading trio completed 16km with a 4:17 lap, it was Garcia's turn to put the hammer down.

As the day got hotter, so did the pace. The next lap was a second quicker but it found Palmisano and Morejon nine seconds back.

The leader sailed on imperiously over the next kilometre, and the battle for second also looked settled. Palmisano got a vital three seconds over the Ecuadorean, and that appeared to be that in deciding first, second, third. However, Morejon would not be denied and lit the afterburners to claw back the deficit and finish a fine second.

There were PBs for Lyra and Bonilla in fifth and sixth behind Gonzalez, who duelled to the line, as well as **Paula Torres** from Ecuador who chopped a massive 3:15 off her previous mark.

France's **Pauline Stey**, ninth, and **Camille Moutard**, 11th, also had reasons to be cheerful as they re-wrote personal records going under 1:30:00 for the first time.

"I liked the circuit very much and was happy to set the record," said Garcia. "Everything is geared to the Olympics and the preparation is going well."

Win No.4 for Karlstrom

Unlike the women, the leading group of 14 men had already creviced a small gap after the first 1km lap, covered in 3:54. The pace eased to a more comfortable 4:03 at 2km, and 11:58, one lap later, suggested things were levelling out with real racing yet to come.

Mexico's **Jose Luis Doctor** and **Ricardo Ortiz** were pushing at the front of a group of nine, but four others ominously including Sweden's multiple world medallist **Karlstrom** were only a couple of seconds back. The pace eased a little more, so that by 5km in 20:00 exactly a single file of 18 streamed through. Parity was almost retained at 7km, but that stretched elastic had whittled the group as it lost three off the back.

Olympic and world bronze medallist **Evan Dunfee** of Canada decided to give it a go at the front and clocked a threesecond lead over former winners **Francisco Fortunato** of Italy, **Caio Bonfim** of Brazil and **Christopher Linke** of Germany, by eighth time round. They in turn had the luxury of a gap to the leading chasers now passing in dribs and drabs.

Karlstrom then hit the accelerator to join the chasing three, and along with Linke and Dunfee they had left Bonfim and Fortunato in their wake at halfway (39:40). Dunfee was just about in touch by 14km, but still four seconds behind the Swede, with Bonfim (55:25) now commanding third ahead of Fortunato (55:37). France's **Gabriel Bordier** was having the race of his life and chasing Fortunato.

A symmetrical 58:58 was Karlstrom's clocking after 15km, with Dunfee staring at the leader's distant back which was getting smaller all the time. Bonfim was an isolated third, but Bordier had drawn level with Fortunato and both were another 30 seconds in arrears.

The race for top spot was over at 17km. By then, Karlstrom was 30 seconds up on Dunfee, although Bonfim was enjoying a second wind and closing in on second place. In fact, there was only seven seconds in it at the bell, but it was enough and the order of the first three was decided. Bordier was a plucky fourth, and last year's winner Fortunato finished a tired sixth. Behind them was a PB for his Italian teammate **Andrea Cosi** in **1:20:56**, improving his previous best by an impressive 43 seconds.

The winner admitted he eased off the pedal despite clocking a meeting record of 1:18:22 to break the existing mark – his own, shared with Bonfim – by 32 seconds.

"I could see at 16km I had a lead, but I was worried my leg was tightening up and so I slowed down a little," said Karlstrom, "but I was still pleased with my performance."
