



**** IMPORTANT ! ... Latest double vaccination information**

Last week in *Heel & Toe Online* we posted advice from Athletics Victoria, stating that those participating in community sports (players, officials) do not need to be double vaccinated against COVID-19. However, later advice (provided the day after last week's issue was sent out) states that certain venues may impose their own double vaccination requirements on those attending.

Our lessor, the Middle Park Bowling Club, has informed us that it is bound by its liquor licence obligations to verify that all persons entering the MPBC property have been double-vaccinated. This means that, while walkers and officials can assemble and race as normal out at the course, they cannot enter the MPBC premises (even to visit the bathroom) unless they can provide suitable evidence of double vaccination.

On arrival at the Club, you will be asked to check in using the VRWC's QR code and to have evidence of double vaccination ready. The accepted forms of proof (for all aged 16+) are shown below:



Here again are the accepted forms of vaccination proof:

- COVID-19 digital certificate using the Service Victoria app
- COVID-19 digital certificate in a smart phone wallet
- Printed copy of COVID-19 digital certificate or immunisation history statement
- Australian Immunisation Register certificate
- Medical certificate or a letter from an authorised medical practitioner.

*Not acceptable: Photographs of printed certificates – even if accompanied by photo ID.

We ask that all members and attendees understand the Club's obligation to comply with this requirement. We have no discretion or 'wriggle room'. If asked for proof of your vaccination status, you are within your rights to refuse ... but please understand that if you do so, you *CANNOT* enter the Bowling club's (and therefore the VRWC's) premises.

* When you arrive at Middle Park, proceed directly to the **start/finish assembly area**, where our check-in table will be located. **DO NOT** enter the Bowling club premises through the car park gate or the driveway.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS

UNITED KINGDOM: Surrey WC Steyning 10km, 6 November - Spithandle Lane, Steyning

Veteran UK international walker and now judge, Shaun Lightman, reports from Surrey:

On a cool, early November afternoon, 9 competitors faced the starter for the Steyning Open 10k. This was a new course of 5 x 1km out and back laps, which met the approval of competitors and officials. This less testing course meant over half the competitors were above or at around their expected level.

At the end of the first lap Grazia Manzotti (Tonbridge) and Trevor Jones (Steyning) had a commanding lead from Ian Richards (Steyning). The leading two had a close duel to the tape, with Grazia gaining a short lead by the tape with a time of 58m 16s from Trevor Jones in 58m 31s and improving by a couple of minutes.

Ian Richards (Steyning) had an enforced stop and was overtaken by newcomer John Arthur (Unattached) just before 6km. John finished 3rd in 63m 56s with Ian in 4th with 66m 10s.

Surrey Walking Club had two representatives: Paul Gaston and Dave Hoben. Paul had a close race with Stuart Maidment (Steyning), but was edged out with Paul finishing 6th in 68m 21s to Stuart's 68m 16s. Dave Hoben finished down the field but both SWC finished with positive performances.

UNITED KINGDOM: Bill Jackson Trophy 5km, 6 November – Simister, Greater Manchester

The Lancashire Walking Club athletes are hardy souls who venture out in all weathers over any type of course. From the photos it looks as if the north of England was turning on its typical late-autumn weather. However, these stalwarts were nothing daunted by the miserable conditions –indeed, they seemed to lap it up.

(In 2009 I had the good fortune to race over 20km from the village of Simister. It was quite an adventure, dodging cars, hay trucks and vans on the way to the beautiful Heaton Park for the 2.5km turn. Out-and-back courses were a common feature of race walking in Australia before mushrooming motor traffic sounded their death knell.)

Dave Evans reports:

Nine sturdy aspirants toed the starting line and headed into a cold strong breeze on the outward 2.5 k leg of the AGM 5k. The handicapper played the usual trick of employing a start of sorts for each wave of walkers but none reflected their real handicap adjustment. The return journey was much more enjoyable I am told but the driving rain both ways was uncomfortable. We had no "guests" on this occasion so the competition was domestic and the final times were pretty good across the board with no one performing "out of character ".

Winner of the handicap and now thankfully back to good health was Martin Payne whose 31 mins 20 in the race proper was only 23 seconds slower than scratch man Adrian Edwards, the latter strolling in the poor conditions and showing excellent style. Tony Bell appears to be benefiting from coaching at his Yorkshire base producing the second-fastest time of the day with a speedy 31 mins 02. Many thanks to Greg Smith for marshalling at the turnaround point and Pat for the post-race catering.

Saturday's race was very cold and windy, with a drizzle that didn't stop, not ideal race conditions. Keeping that in mind, we only had a small turn out, nice and balanced with, 3 athletes from Wellington Scottish, 3 from Trentham United, and 3 from Wellington Harriers lining up at the start line.

In the Open Men grade, Daniel du Toit took the lead from the start falling into a steady rhythm and finishing with a comfortable time of 13:18.29. Clive McGovern came in second and was very pleased to break the 18-minute barrier, Brent McLean finished in third. In the Open Women, Sarah du Toit, currently battling a knee injury, was first in 20:51.89, followed by Helen Willis in second and Daphne Jones in third. Overall, it was a good event and an enjoyable day.

Joseph du Toit finished his 1,800m walk in 12:11.61.

Daniel started race walking from the age of 11. He has multiple national titles under his belt, set a few national records, and holds almost all the junior, U18, and U20 Wellington records.

2019 must've been one of his best seasons, highlights being his winning the New Zealand U18 3,000m race walk, the Australian Championships U17 5,000m Race Walk, as well as representing New Zealand at the Oceania Championships U18 5,000m Race Walk, not only winning the race but setting a new championship record. Recently Daniel has been struggling with technique issues but is slowly getting back into form, with a lot of help from his support team.

What Katie did next - an 80-kilometre treadmill walk for Gumboot Friday

It took Katie Tahere 13 hours to walk 80 kilometres on a treadmill.

"My calves were screaming," she said on Sunday, the day after her charity effort. "It's pretty tough on the feet. A treadmill is like walking on concrete."

Tahere hopes to have raised more than \$1000 from her walk, which she undertook for Gumboot Friday, which is raising money to give young people free mental health counselling.

She started walking at 9am and finished at 10pm. "I was hoping to do it in 12 hours," she said, "but I'm pleased with how it went."





Tahere, who lost two of her whānau *(family)* to suicide within a week, said she was buoyed by the stream of supporters who called in to see her on the treadmill at Anytime Fitness, Waiwhakaiho.

Earlier this year, Tahere walked 73.95km in 12 hours around the grassed area next to the New Plymouth Wind Wand for the cause. However, plans to raise more funds on Saturday with a charity auction had to be postponed because of the pandemic.

Tahere has a 2015 All Blacks World Cup jersey to sell to raise money, as well as items donated by the Taranaki Bulls and Beauden Barrett.

"We want to hold it before Christmas," she said.

Sad news from David Ainsworth in England:

** FRED BAKER R.I.P. **

One of our all-time ultra-distance walking greats has passed on, aged 88.

Legendary **Fred Baker** of Highgate Harriers completed **19** UK sub-24 hours' 100 miles races, commencing with a 22:30.13 timing in the testing 1956 Sheffield-to-Harrogate-and-back (staged over Yorkshire's hills-and-dales), which saw 38 start & 21 finish (8 becoming new Centurions).

Fred earned Centurion number **266.** He served as The Centurions' Honorary Secretary from 1986-to-1995. When stepping down he passed this position on to fellow Highgate Harrier Bill Sutherland BEM.

In 1982 Fred was elected as a Centurions' Vice-President. He resided in Carlisle, in a care home during his last days. For decades life was split between the UK and Australia, where he owned property. Needless to say, he was in Carlisle for our spring and summer and, when weather turned for the worse, he was off "*down under*" for 6 months. He was one never to be forgotten. Our condolences to his family members.
