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# \*\* AUSTRALIAN LINE-UP ANNOUNCED FOR 2022 WORLD ATHLETICS RACE WALKING TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Athletics Australia has announced a 12-strong team of race walkers to compete at the World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships taking place in Muscat, Oman next month.

Australia has a rich history at the World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships, having won medals at every edition of the Championships since 2004, and this year, the athletes selected are ready to extend upon the country's success.

The 20km men's team will be led by 2022 Australian Champion **Declan Tingay**, with Tokyo Olympians **Rhydian Cowley** and **Kyle Swan** joining him. 2016 World Under 20 representative **Tyler Jones** and 19-year-old **Will Thompson** will round out the team to make their senior team debut in Muscat.

Australia will also have a sole female athlete competing, with 2016 World Under 20 representative **Clara Smith** making her international 20km debut, and one competitor in the 35km individual event as **Carl Gibbons** dons the green and gold for the second time.

Five junior athletes including Australian 10km race walking champions **Olivia Sandery** and **Marcus Wakim**, as well as **Alanna Peart**, **Allanah Pitcher** and **Fraser Saunder** have also been selected, highlighting that the strong tradition of Australian race walking is in good hands.

General Manager, High Performance Andrew Faichney noted the significance of the Championships as part of a major year for Australia's race walkers.

"This is one of the bigger championships for our race walkers as it boasts a larger and more competitive field with five athletes per country in each event. The World Athletics Championships in Oregon and the Commonwealth Games are the main priorities for our race walkers this year, however these Championships will give them an indication of where each of them are sitting against their competitors, and give them an opportunity to lay their foundations down for the year," Faichney said.

"We're extremely proud to announce these 12 athletes onto our first Australian team for 2022, and we look forward to seeing them thrive amongst the world's best once again."

Athletics Australia also announced the two team coaches for Championships; Athletics Australia Event Group Lead Brent Vallance, and Olympic gold medallist Jared Tallent, who was last year selected to participate in AA's Athlete to Coach Pathway Program.

Vallance said he was most looking forward to seeing the men's team in action, as well as Smith and Jones competing internationally for the first time since 2016 after finding their way back to the sport.

"While we won't have a complete women's team this year due to clashes with our domestic season, our men's 20km team is certainly the strongest we've fielded since before the London Olympic Games. I'm really excited by what our men can do in this team, not only at this Championships but as we look ahead to the Paris Olympics in two years' time," Vallance said.

"We're thrilled to have Clara and Tyler back in the fold; both of them are walking PBs and adding to the depth of our talent pool as we look to Paris, but we also have a very capable junior female athletes, with one of our standouts being Olivia Sandery.

"We've won medals in that junior female event before, and this year's team are comparable to those. Olivia too is capable of bringing home a medal, and we view this as a great stepping-stone before athletes make their transition to senior teams."

Tingay, Swan and Olympic 50km walker Cowley all finished their Tokyo campaigns with career-best performances,

and for Tingay, a 17th place finish upon his Olympic debut has given him the confidence of his ability to succeed in Muscat.

"It's a real privilege to be selected and a really exciting opportunity to be going to Oman with the team. I made my international debut at the World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships, and last time I was there with Kyle, we came away with a bronze medal in the junior team competition," Tingay said.

"Our team this year is good. We have lots of depth, including four of us returning to this competition. I'm personally aiming to finish within the top 20 for the individual event or extend myself to finish in the top 16 to do better than Tokyo, and as a team we are aiming to finish on the podium."

The World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships will take place from 4-5 March.

# \*\* SAVILLE'S RECORD FALLS TO MONTAG \*\*

Cool, crisp conditions that belied the 33C forecast temperature that would strike later, greeted the 38 walkers who assembled at War Memorial Drive for this year's Australia & Oceania Open & U20 championships. With so much international representation at stake this year – starting with the WA Race Walking Teams Championship in Muscat – not much more incentive to excel here was needed. The marquee events – the 20 kilometres for Open men and women – commenced first and, as they unfolded, would have disappointed no-one who saw them.

**Jemima Montag** made a statement and a half to the walking world with a new Australian record of **1:27.27**, eclipsing Jane Saville's 17 year-old mark by 17secs. Troubled by injury niggles following her post-Sapporo quarantine at

Howard Springs, Jemima's return to form hasn't been plain sailing, but her display last Sunday shows those issues are now well behind her.

Heading a small field of five competitors, Montag went out hard for an initial 4km split of 17:31. Behind her, **Bec Henderson** went through in 18:36 with **Clara Smith** 10secs adrift. Masters marvel **Kelly Ruddick**, after a conservative start, had picked up pace for 19:49 for the split, 24secs ahead of **Hannah Mison**.

With Montag hitting 10km in 43:47 and on target for a huge result, interest turned to Henderson and a resurgent Smith, back in calculations after an absence from major racing. Passing 10km in 45:53, the Victorian walker-triathlete (the youngest competitor in the Sapporo 20km) was gradually increasing her lead over Smith (46:32 at 10) who was hanging in well in her first 20k for four years. Ruddick, 49:08, was lapping with amazing consistency as was Mison who was focused on her own goals.

Positions would not change in the second half, the focus now upon whether Montag would break Saville's national record – which, of course, she did, to the delight of her family, supporters and the crowd. "It feels surreal right now," she said afterwards. "That national record is something I've been thinking about for a few years, but we've had the pandemic and the races cancelled. Often at times it hasn't been the right weather or right conditions, it wasn't what I had in mind but I could feel it was on in the first 5km." <sup>1</sup>

Bec Henderson, after a typically uncompromising effort that possibly showed the effects of a gruelling summer of training and Supernova racing, crossed second in **1:31.44**, her best by 9secs. Clara Smith, next home, was rightly delighted with her 3:29 PB for **1:33.37**, after not completing a 20 since 2017. Kelly Ruddick sped up to negative-split the second half for **1:36.58**, a new Victorian Masters W45 record. The day's massive improver was taillight Hannah Mison, whose **1:44.32** destroyed her previous PB by close to 10 minutes!



In the Men's race, **Kyle Swan** and **Declan Tingay** dictated terms from the gun, passing 4km in 16:45 with NZ rep **Quentin Rew** in close attendance. Around 25secs further back, **Rhydian Cowley** and 20km debutant **Will Thompson** held a four second gap on **Tyler Jones**, himself well clear of a bunch containing **Carl Gibbons**, **Tristan Camilleri**, **Tim Fraser** and **Mitchell Baker**.

Swan and Tingay then put the foot down for a 16:15 split to reach 8km in 32:58, dropping the gritty Rew by 6secs. Cowley, now joined by Jones, passed 8km in 33:52 with Thompson falling back for 34:21. Baker, Gibbons and Camilleri reached 8km with only a second's gap between them.

Nothing separated the leaders at 10km, both crossing in 41:07, with Rew at 41:23 and now in no-man's land. Thompson, 42:47 and on a learning curve, was fighting to keep his deficit to Cowley and Jones from blowing out, while no member of the 'Gibbons group' had yet managed to force a break, going through in 43:46 to 43:48.

Over the 12-14km stage Swan ventured an attack, opening a 3-second gap that had closed by 16km, with Tingay now leading. Rew was doing it tough out alone, while the experienced Cowley had broken Jones's brave challenge with Thompson keeping the New South Welshman in sight with a consistent rate in the mid-8:20s. Gibbons had applied the pressure to leave the other pack members strung out behind him, each fighting to maintain his pace as fatigue took hold.

Two ripping sub-8 final laps saw **Declan Tingay** cross the line for an emphatic win and a huge PB in **1:20.44**, achieved with sound tactical judgement. "I didn't really plan on walking that fast this morning," said Tingay. "I had planned on qualifying for World Champs via the points system. To find a few extra gears today and knock the time out this early in the season is awesome." <sup>2</sup>

Kyle Swan could not match Tingay's speed on the day but deserved credit for putting his cards on the table earlier, also earning a big PB with his **1:21.39**. Achieving these results so early in the year augurs well for both men's international campaigns.

Popular Kiwi Quentin Rew, for most of the race an island unto himself, took a clear Oceania bronze in **1:22.23**. Rhydian Cowley, only recently returned to serious training, managed a negative split to claim the National bronze in **1:23.29**, while Tyler Jones rallied for a sizeable PB of his own of **1:24.10**.

Will Thompson showed toughness and maturity beyond his years in opening his 20km account with an excellent **1:24.40**, while 4 of the final 7 finishers would also go home with PBs beside their names after a memorable day of hard racing in a quality field.

The U20 Women's 10km saw local star **Olivia Sandery** go straight into a lead she never relinquished, extending it with each lap for a commanding win in **46:35**. Ballarat's **Alanna Peart** kept Sandery in sight in the first lap, losing contact once the South Aussie stepped on the gas but holding on for silver in **48:30**. NSW's **Allanah Pitcher** has rebuilt her distance condition over the summer after two pandemic-affected years, taking the bronze on this occasion with **49:40**. All three girls again recorded World Team Championship qualifiers, giving those who finished behind them plenty of incentive to do the work necessary to emulate them.

Disappointingly, only two boys fronted for the U20 Men's 10km, indicating that some strategic planning is in order to build up our male youth walking depth, post-pandemic. **Marcus Wakim** and **Fraser Saunder**, both eyeing Muscat qualifiers, raced as if shackled together for 8km before Wakim slipped in a sub-9 last lap to pull away from his Victorian teammate for a good win. Wakim (**45:56**) and Saunder (**46:04**) recorded almost identical PBs and, of course, those qualifiers. Well done, lads!

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# INTERNATIONAL NEWS

### FRANCE: National Youth Indoor championships, 12 February - Rennes

Emmanuel Tardi reports from Rennes, where despite wintry weather outside, the competition indoors was hot:

I was in Rennes (capital of Brittany, 300km in the west of Paris) on Saturday, for the National indoor Championship for the Youth category (U18 U20 U23). There was also a race for the best "non young" walker who have not walked this year under 21mins for men (5000m) and 14mins (3000m) for women.

8 races were scheduled from 12:00 to 17:00.

In U18, Lena Auvray beat her French Record (13'55, set last December).

In U20, Elvina Carre did all the race alone and won easily.

The U23 was the best race, with 5 walkers who battled in the first half of the race. Maele Bire-Heslouis  $(2^{nd}$  last summer in the World championship in Kenya) finally won.

In the N2 race, **Anne-Catherine Quenehervé** beat the W55 world best time in 14'46 (previously set by Australian Lyn Ventris at 14'51 in 2012). Quenehervé (previously Berthonnaud) was 39 times in the French team between 1983 and 2000.

In the Men's U18, Quentin Chenuet won very easily.

### UNITED KINGDOM: Bob Wright H'cap series, 23 Jan, 6 Feb, 13 Feb – Guernsey

#### First Series Win for Stuart Le Noury

A new name appeared on the Bob Wright Memorial Trophy when grandson Stuart became the latest in the family to win it. Usually seen winning most Sarnia events in recent years, the trophy until now has been out of his reach. But it was close this time with Stuart only just beating second placed Mick Le Sauvage on count back after seven races. With one race falling foul to the weather it ended up as a six race series with five to score, Stuart taking the overall win after securing higher positions in the races. Kevin Le Noury took third place overall.

Remarkably, there have been 13 different winners of the trophy since 2008, with Jayne Le Noury winning it three times in that period.

In the final race over 3 kilometres it was Kevin Le Noury winning easily with Stuart taking second place, leaving Dave Dorey and Mick Le Sauvage behind in the final straight. The windy conditions did nothing to dampen the enthusiasm of the small field, with the final two walkers still active after many years in the sport at ages 75 and 82 respectively.

Donna Allan had taken victory in the penultimate race over 2 kilometres with a late sprint to head Mick Le Sauvage by two seconds, with Kevin Le Noury a further two behind that.

Another event over 5 kilometres saw Stuart Le Noury finish in 28.42, in a race held in very windy and unhelpful conditions.

### JOHN 'PADDY' DOWLING 1929 – 2022 Irish ultra-walker *par excellence*



It was announced last week that Irish walking legend **John 'Paddy' Dowling** had passed away, aged 93. While his name may not be familiar to many outside the ultra-distance walking world, Paddy's was an extraordinary story, by any reckoning.

Although a survivor of horrendous childhood privation and brutality, he was clearly not one to allow this to define him. Rather, Paddy's past appears to have hardened him like steel, paving the way for the endurance exploits that earned him widespread admiration and respect within his

own shores and beyond.

From the many tributes and messages circulating on social media pages and elsewhere, one did not need to have met Paddy to deduce that here was a tough yet gentle man, determined to push his own physical and mental boundaries yet valuing the bonds of friendship that come with club affiliation and society. His love of music – a very Irish trait – showed another dimension to his personality that would have gladdened hearts around him.
