# **\*\* WALKER OF THE WEEK \*\***

Two excellent performances by our leading 35km specialists - Olivia Sandery (SA) and Rhydian Cowley (VIC) - have earned them this issue's WOTW awards.

Olivia, having found her niche distance, sundered her own Australian record by 2:49 in winning the Open section of the Asian Race Walking Championships in Nomi (JAP) on Sunday, recording a new mark of 2:42:40 which is also a new Oceania area record. With the 35km due to extend to the full marathon distance following the WA World Championships in Tokyo this year, Olivia has a load of confidence and incentive to make a big statement against the world's best in September, as well as taking the next 7km-long step up to the historic distance.

Rhydian was up with the leaders in the men's race for most of the way (see Paul Warburton's report in International *News*), and despite some rough patches hung on for  $2^{nd}$  in the Open and  $4^{th}$  place overall, joining Olivia in taking home a new national and Oceania record of 2:25:21. En route, Rhydian removed from the books Nathan Deakes' 19yo national 30km record by nearly 2:00. Saying Rhyd is in the form of his life doesn't seem to cut it, and he probably wouldn't accept it anyway as he'd see room to improve before peaking for Tokyo.

Congratulations, Olivia and Rhyd ... and all the best for your preparations for the World champs!

- Allanah Pitcher (NSW)  $4^{th}$  in the Nomi Open 35km with a 2:57 PB and a WA qualifying time of 2:47:26 in a most welcome return to form.
- Carl Gibbons (NSW) the hard-working Gosford distance man finished a creditable 7<sup>th</sup> (13<sup>th</sup> overall) in the Nomi Open 35km, in 2:38:05, just over minute shy of his PB.

- Alexandra Griffin (WA) on debut, Ali finished 5<sup>th</sup> (6<sup>th</sup> overall) in the Open 35km in Nomi in 2:51:54, less than 4:00 from a WA qualifier and demonstrating her potential over long distances.

# Katsuki claims 35km race walk victory in Nomi

The overall winner of the 35km at the All-Japan Race Walking Championships - part of the **World Athletics Race Walking Tour** - in Nomi on Sunday (16) was a big surprise.

At 34, **Hayato Katsuki** produced the race of his life to win handsomely in **2:24:38**, earning a place on Japan's team for the World Championships on home soil in September.

Katsuki struggled at one point on the sodden course where it rained from start to finish, but was left beaming over the last one-kilometre circuit when victory was assured. At 31km, he made a break and never looked back to finish with a massive PB by almost two minutes.

Australia's **Olivia Sandery** took the women's 35km title in an Oceanian record of **2:42:40**, while **Yukiko Umeno** was the leading Japanese finisher in **2:46:52**.

World Championship berths were on offer for Japanese race walkers in the 35km, as well as another chance to qualify at the shorter 20km in a second group of races. Any Japanese race walker wanting a place on the team in the 35km had to finish inside 2:26:00 (men) and 2:45 (women). Factor in the Asian Championships; the open race, the All Japan Race Walking title, plus additional 10km races, and there was enough silverware on the presentation table to make it groan.

There was also a healthy showing from other countries, particularly Australia, whose athletes were likewise hoping to make an impression on selectors.

The 35km field had the course all to themselves following an 8am start on a grim morning of steady rain and temperatures of 7C. A group of seven hit the first kilometre in 4:15 including all the main Japanese contenders and Australians **Rhydian Cowley** and **Tim Fraser** alongside Mexico's **Noel Chama**. They reached 5km in a little over 21 minutes, by which time they were already lapping women who started at the same time.

That group of seven were trailed by another seven just a few metres behind. They quickly closed the gap only to find the original seven plus two forging another small gap. Andres Nunez from Mexico had joined the throng wearing ear warmers to underline the damp conditions. As quickly as the biggish group came, it went.

Another injection of pace whittled the leaders to six at 10km, including pre-race favourite **Satoshi Maruo, Kazuki Takahashi**, Katsuki, **Tomohiro Noda**, Nunez and Cowley in 41:32; the second group had lost 13 seconds. The same six appeared joined at the hip for the next 5km to make a 15km split of 1:01:58. Any other contender was by now too far back to make a difference.



The next major change came on lap 18 with Katsuki and Cowley forced to give way, but in the case of the Japanese, only for a 1km lap. Katsuki sprinted to join the other four. It was 1:22:11 at 20km, and this time Noda found himself detached.

With 13km to go, Maruo had clearly held off long enough and set off for home. Katsuki was having none of it, and quickly closed the gap with Nunez also giving chase. In fact, it was Takahashi who became the casualty.

Cowley, struggling on his own 25 metres off the back, seemed to find the rain a welcome refreshment as he worked his way back to the front a little after 25km timed at 1:42:32 for the leaders. This time it looked as if the Australian and Katsuki meant business. There was also daylight between Maruo and Nunez with 2:03:15 for the two in front at 30km with an eight-second gap to third and fourth.

However, that effort by Cowley had taken its toll. Katsuki made yet another attempt to break through, and this time it

really was decisive. Cowley slipped back as the leader soared through and on his own for the last 3km while Nunez got a second wind to record **2:25:08**, with Maruo, **2:25:19**, overtaking a tired Cowley right at the end.

In the women's 35km, Australia's Olivia Sandery underlined her potential with an overall win in **2:42:40**. She set the previous Oceanian record in December with 2:45:31, but in Nomi she decimated it in a strong, steady race with a final burst of 23:04 for the last 5km. In contrast, Colombia's 2021 Olympic silver medallist **Sandra Lorena** went for broke at the outset, and paid for it. Her last two 5km splits (24:05) and (25:38) saw Sandery take advantage. Even so, Lorena's **2:44:17** clocking was still better than her previous 2:46:44 from October.

Among the Japanese contenders, **Hitomi Shimoka** made a strong impression early on, but **Yukiko Umeno** drew level at about 13km and went on to finish third overall in **2:46:53**; sadly outside her country's qualification mark. Australia's **Allanah Pitcher** came through strongly to take fourth, also in a PB.

In the men's 20km, Yuta Koga prevailed in a speedy 1:18:48 to go with his 1:18:26 in Kobe in February, and 20-year-old Ning Jinlin from China shattered her PB by close to three minutes with 1:30:03 for the overall win.

#### UNITED KINGDOM: A birthday tribute to BILL SUTHERLAND

**David Ainsworth** has sent through the following article on Bill Sutherland, Scotland's only race walking Commonwealth medallist and one of the stalwarts of the UK club racing scene:

#### **BILL's MILESTONE**

Regular Essex Walker contributor **Bill Sutherland** is to celebrate his **80th** birthday on Sunday April 6th. Bill was an established name from the mid-60s onwards soon coming to the attention of International Selectors, and included among International appearances were major events such as European Championships and Commonwealth Games plus National Championship titles.



Bill's name was synonymous with the famous Highgate Harriers, who in such earlier times could put out 'A', 'B', 'C' & 'D' teams in 4-to-score Open races, County, Area and National Championships. Bill's name was often first on Middlesex County team sheets. He was a loyal member of the Metropolitan Police and British Police Representative teams and turned out for both with regularity. Those were times when top race walkers were active most weeks and for the Met. He'd be there for Inter Club races, as indeed he was for Highgate events. He was always prominent on the much-missed "Highgate 1 Hour races" which saw packed tracks (at both Parliament Hill Fields and Copthall Stadium) over 4 graded races - to wit 'A'-to-'D' Sections with Bill a leading light as an 'A' competitor.

Bill was the first Scottish athlete to gain a medal in the 1970 Edinburgh Commonwealth Games - bronze in the 20 Miles Walk clocking **2:37.24**. He didn't get quite the kudos merited, as when entering Meadowbank Stadium for a lap of the track towards the finish line, legendary BBC athletics commentator David Coleman didn't know who he was - apart from him being a tall policeman. Bill had some luck as the "smart money" was on an Australian 1-2-3, but for some unexplained reason they only selected two, who came 1st & 2nd, leaving out 1968 Olympian Frank Clark, who a couple of years earlier had a brief spell with Ilford AC. Bill failed to appear in Scotland's official Commonwealth Games team photograph - as when sent his blazer it didn't fit so needed alteration. It wasn't returned in time for the photograph and an official prevented him taking a place before the lens as he wasn't attired like the others.

Come 1972, Bill's name was "on the radar" for Munich Olympic selection. Paul Nihill & Phil Embleton, both sadly no longer with us, were 20k "certs" so a 3rd spot was up for grabs. Things didn't go Bill's way in the Selection Committee room - though when names were announced the one-and-only Arthur Gold told Bill he should have been selected. Despite Arthur being "all powerful" he couldn't overturn a Race Walking Association recommendation. Upset as Bill was - and still is - he put profound disappointment aside to campaign hard, with others, against a decision to cease race walking as an Olympic event. Bill spent much time visiting places here-and-there, often using his own leave to do so in a bid to drum up support for retention of our discipline on the Olympic programmes.

Bill had a spell away from Highgate Harriers to join Ilford AC and was so active he was elected as a most popular President in 1994/95. When at the top table for Ilford's Annual Dinner & Dance at Chigwell's Police Sports & Social Club his chosen after-dinner guest speaker was another *"one-and-only"* person - the late Mel Batty. It was a memorable occasion. Bill's a proud B.E.M. (British Empire Medal) recipient - when at Buckingham Palace to receive it from a now late Queen Elizabeth II he acquired a top hat and put it under his chair in the presentation hall. A Palace *flunkey* tapped a shoulder to inform him guests are required to place such items in cloakrooms!

He was an Organising Committee member of a 1989 "Arthur Eddlestone BEM Memorial 100 Miles Walk at Hendon Police Training School (100 x 1 mile around its perimeter in atrocious weather) which was a major successful promotion. Bill was determined to complete a 100 Miles' Walk, for membership of an exclusive Centurions' organisation, open only athletes completing this distance in under 24 hours. He did so at the 1991 Ewhurst 100 Miles in Surrey around a 10 x 10 miles course, clocking 23:49.36 to become member 890. As the task got tougher during cold of the night Bill's wife and greatest supporter for decades, Kath, cheered up spirits by singing *"Maybe It's Because I'm A Londoner"*. When interviewed by a reporter from his local newspaper (Islington Gazette) about this feat he was asked where he'd put up for the night? Bill told her 100 miles start one day/finish the next, with competitors competing through the night - not sleeping! The journalist was most impressed. Bill contributed to The Centurions by serving as their Honorary Secretary from 1994-to-1999.

Bill has returned to Highgate Harriers and nowadays is prominent as an ideas and suggestions man, following in footsteps of great Highgate Harrier Charlie Megnin R.I.P., a 1946 European Championship 50K Walk bronze medallist. His main love in recent times is park runs, where he's compiled a long list of both appearances as a participant and as an official/helper, having received service awards for so doing. We wish Bill well on his 80th birthday.
