### VALE JUDITH ANN MASON

#### 1939 - 2022

It is with sadness that we have to inform readers of the passing of another of the VRWC's Life members, **Judy Mason**, who died early on Monday morning after a period of declining health.

Judy was associated with VRWC since the mid 1980s and, along with her late husband Harry, she fulfilled a variety of official positions within the club. In particular, she was Race Secretary for 6 years, from 1988 to 1994. Her weekly typed race reports from that period form an important part of the club archive, especially since our 'Heel & Toe' newsletter was only produced intermittently during that time. While she was helping run the day-to-day activities of the club, Harry fulfilled the position of Vice President (1991-1994).

Although they stepped down from the committee in the mid 1990's, they both remained involved in the club, Harry as an official (and our official course measurer) and Judy as a judge and general helper. They were also deeply

involved at both the AV and AA levels and were fittingly joint winners of the AV Official of the Year for 2006. A highpoint of Judy's career as a judge and official would have to have been her role as part of the Olympic judging panel at the 2000 Games in Sydney. (Thanks to Judy's daughter Marilla for sending us the photo below.)

On behalf of all at the VRWC, I have contacted Marilla to offer our condolences to the Mason family and their friends. We wish them peace, togetherness and the comfort to be found in shared reminiscences during what will be, for them, a very different Christmas. In turn, Marilla has asked me to convey to our members the family's appreciation of the high regard in which her mother was remembered at the Club.

Emily Smith and 11yo Mya McClure made their intentions clear in the 2000m with fast starts, before being joined by Danny Hawksworth. Danny edged ahead to win in 10:21.9, with Mya just 5secs adrift and Emily fighting off a fast-finishing Trenton Hawkins. Among the VRWC walkers, Gwen Steed was the standout, having set an inaugural Club W80 record with her 14:19.4.

After a noteworthy year of walking achievements, including a succession of shared WOTW wins and honourable mentions, Tasmania's **Will Bottle** has won the award outright this week with a lightning-fast **5:47.02**, taking fastest time honours in the Albert Johnson Memorial 1500m Handicap in Hobart. Will's time, a PB by 18secs, comes off the back of his strong PB result in Adelaide last week over 5000m against Victoria's Marcus Wakim. 1500m races are infrequently walked by top juniors or seniors these days, so this result serves as a vivid indicator of the natural speed Will has at his disposal with the big occasion summer races coming up in the next three months. Well done, Will!

#### UNITED KINGDOM: Surrey WC Xmas Cup results, 19 November – Tonbridge School, Tonbridge

It took a while to get these results, but I finally managed to do so via the December edition of Race Walking Record.

This annual event was the first 'A' judged race for a number of months and attracted a good field, including a healthy number of younger athletes. The weather was ideal, cool with very little wind.

Luc Legon, as in 2021, was the overall winner of the 5000m, lapping all but second place, training partner Matthew Crane. First woman was Abigail Jennings with a personal best time. Mark Ashby was the first male veteran, in his debut over 5000m.

Ashford's **Jessica Wilton** removed over three minutes from her previous best for the distance finishing one second behind the first veteran athlete **Grazia Manzotti**, who also recorded a personal best.

In the 3000m all athletes achieved personal bests with **Charlie Perry** just staying clear of **Matthew Tootell** to take the win.

#### MORE ON GEORGE LARNER – THE FIRST OLYMPIC WALKS GOLD MEDALLIST

In Issue 48, Tim Erickson informed us of vet another priceless book on race walking in his collection – on this occasion, Larner's Textbook on Walking by pioneer race walking Olympic champion George Larner. Tim has already written an biographical article on Larner which can be found at http://www.vrwc.org.au/tim-archive/articles/wo-george-larner.pdf . In it, he makes reference to another article by Sussex walker Alan Buchanan, whose research into that southern county's athletic past led him to write this fascinating article on race walking first-ever Olympic gold medallist.

#### GEORGE LARNER - SUSSEX'S FIRST OLYMPIC CHAMPION

At the 1908 London Olympics, George Larner of Brighton and County Harriers, won the 3,500m Walk and the 10 miles Walk. Those distances were never raced again, so to this day Sussex has a club athlete who holds the two Olympic gold medals and the Olympic records.

I switched from running to race walking in 1966, encouraged by Arthur Jones, who two years later was selected for the 20km at the Mexico City Olympics, along with Brighton and Hove AC club mates Chris Carter (800m) and Andy Todd (4 x 400m relay). I worked for the Brighton and Hove Herald through the sixties and researched their archives at the time to write an article on George Larner for the Race Walking Record.

Although born in Berkshire in 1875, he took up walking with the club in 1903, aged 28 and soon showed an aptitude for the event, winning four AAA titles in the following couple of years, including nine world records. He was a Brighton Police Constable and soon found that his duties prevented him from serious walk training. The Chief Constable was made aware of this and in 1906 the County Borough of Brighton Watch Committee gave Larner special dispensation, to train for the London Olympic Games, which were to be held in 1908.

In his first race back in the AAA 7 miles championship, he was disqualified for lifting but writers at the time were complimentary of his long striding technique, and he put this aside to go on and win both golds with the added bonus of a 75.57.4 World record in the 10 miles.

I spoke to those who had seen Larner walk at the time, including former Argus correspondent Jack "Jackdaw" Davis. He had been present when Larner set the World 3 miles and 4 miles records, on the grass track within the cycle track at

Brighton's Preston Park, in August 1905. Jack was not too complimentary of Larner's technique describing it, "like a shuffle," but others, including Ernest Neville, who was in that race and would go on to be a top class AAA timekeeper and founder of the Road Runners Club, were quite happy and admired him.

After the games, Larner went back onto the Brighton beat and I recollect reading about his involvement in a Brighton house fire rescue, while reading the Herald Archives. He went back to running with the Brighton club and a few years later he moved to London, here he returned to walking with Highgate Harriers winning the 1911 AAA 7 miles title. George Larner died in Brighton in 1949 aged 73.

In 1967 I raced in a one mile track walk at Walton on Thames, in an attempt by Arthur Jones to beat Larner's British Record of 6:26 - but he failed. It was Roger Mills who eventually took the record at Crystal Palace a few years later.

My good friend, Keith May, wrote the story of the great runner Alf Shrubb, who in the early 1900s set 10 World Records. In the same era, George Larner also set 10 world records. Thus, between 1903 and 1908, Sussex had two outstanding multiple World Record holders.

For the record, Larner's achievements were:

- 3 miles in 20.25.8
- 4 miles 27.14.0
- 5 miles 36.00.2
- 6 miles 43.26.2
- 7 miles in 50.50.8
- 8 miles 58.18.4
- 9 miles in 1.07.37.8
- 10 miles in 1.15.57.4
- 13.275m in a one hour track race.



Race Walking was for many years well supported in Sussex and the rest of England but nowadays the top walkers have become so fit that, in my view, they are too fast for the rules. No longer able to compete on open roads, the event has faded out in Britain, with only a small number of participants in few races.

I was fortunate to have competed during the best years in the 1970s when the 'Larner Legacy' was still alive in British walking.

Few sportspersons can expect to have the honour of their name emblazoned on their local bus.

When George Larner was born in 1875, there was no such thing as a motor car as we know it, let alone a double decker bus. He however, is celebrated on one of the Brighton & Hove buses, and is one of the only sportspersons and is the only athlete who rubs shoulders, metaphorically, with the great and good associated with the City.
