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** WALKER OF THE WEEK **

'Tis the season to be contesting State championships around the country, and it's not surprising that our WOTW candidates would be drawn from these important competitions.

Depending on the prevailing conditions, championship races usually see improved times from younger athletes in particular, and this week the spotlight falls on talented up and comer **Milly Sharpe (QLD, 16).** A diligent and ambitious walker, Milly had a very successful 2024, in which a DQ in January was the only race out of 17 in which she didn't either win or finish in the top 3 ... these included all club and interstate championships, as well as her first international representation in the Oceania titles in Suva. Racing over 10km for only the third time, Milly earned her WOTW in last weekend's QA 10,000m championships by taking bronze with a huge 2:39 PB of **50:40.94**, smashing the time she recorded at January's Supernova race amid a world-class field and showing the value of that experience. Milly will surely be setting her sights on her first sub-50:00 result, and her evident dedication to training under coach Shane Pearson indicates that that milestone won't be far away.

Well done, Milly, and best of luck with the nationals in Perth!

- **Jemima Montag** and **Rhydian Cowley (VIC)** occupying the same spot as last week, on the basis of 'class above' performances to win their respective AV 5000m titles.
- Ela Uzun (VIC) came to within 4 secs breaking her own formidable State U14 and U15 3000m records.
- Koby Irvine (QLD) took a huge 1:10 from his 3000m PB in taking silver behind Noah Cooke in the QA State titles.



AV Track & Field C'ships, Sunday 23 February – Lakeside Stadium

A healthy tally of 40 walkers lined up for the Walks titles on day 2 of this year's AV track championships, to be greeted by challenging heat and capricious wind gusts that hit the 5000m races while leaving the 3000s alone. That aside, the events were keenly contested and the overall standard of walking was high. The 5000m races were up first, with **Jemima Montag** and **Rhydian Cowley** picking up from where they left off in Adelaide last week and claiming another title each.

In Cowley's case it was a genuine 'Bradbury' moment.¹ **Declan Tingay** had broken away with 4 laps remaining and was sitting pretty for the gold when, rounding the bend into the home straight, he found himself facing a '30secs' paddle and had to watch ruefully from the cone castle as the Glenhuntly champ whipped by to cross first. Declan was released in plenty of time to complete the last 100m for 2nd, with **Kyle Swan** taking championship silver half a minute in arrears. **Eden Morgan** took bronze with his first senior track podium placing plus a 1 sec PB.

Montag's win was no surprise, the interest being in whether or not she would go after the Victorian record she set here in 2022. A mere week's break after her sub-1:28:00 national 20km win probably made that unrealistic, leaving her content to clock another sub-21:00 win while holding France's Clemence Beretta at bay. The Lakeside track was very much to Beretta's liking in 2024 when she broke through the 21 min barrier on it herself for a French national record and, with Jemima in the field this time, she'd have hoped to improve on that. While it wasn't to be, Clemence kept the Olympic bronze medallist in sight most of the way and took a convincing 2nd place over Bec Henderson, also recovering from her 1:28:11 20km PB in Adelaide and unable to match the French speedster on the day. Alanna Peart, another whose focus has been on mileage for 20kms, repeated her bronze medal placing from last year and will now look ahead to Perth and her next international opportunity.

On a day that wasn't conducive to PBs, **Jade Chitty** seized the opportunity presented by a qualify field to rip nearly half a minute from her previous 5000m best. Good work, Jade.

¹ In 2002, Steven Bradbury became the first Australian to win Winter Olympics gold when he – the rank outsider in the 4-man speed skating final – kept his feet while the three ahead of him crashed into the wall, sailing past them to take the gold medal. Delighted as the Aussies were, the true sweet moment came after an NBC commentator sneered at Bradbury's achievement: "Enjoy your gold medal, Australia – you'll have a long wait until the next one." Three days later, Alisa Camplin won the next one in the aerial skiing.

² Arnika was 5th finisher overall. Jade, although ranked below her having finished 6th, was 4th Victorian. The other Victorians follow sequentially.

The best of the age-group 5000m's saw an arm wrestle between World Teams co-reps **Riley Coughlan** and **Marcus Wakim**, with Riley prevailing in the straight by a mere 4 secs after a gruelling contest. **Max Davidson** was unlucky to have an off-day amidst a high-calibre field, but he has plenty of time in which to regroup before the Nationals in April.

Ariana Pashutina, with her usual consistent pace, had the best of the age-group women's results, while Lucy Johns, a novice at this distance, gave a good account of herself in the trying conditions.

While it was still warm, the wind had dropped by the time the gun went for the U14-U16 3000m championships. Not surprisingly, the walking fraternity behind the fence were keen to see what stopwatch treats 13yo dynamo **Ela Uzun** would conjure up, and she left no doubt of her intentions as she surged to a long lead to win with a time a mere 3 secs shy of the astonishing Victorian record she posted at Doncaster three weeks ago. Behind Ela, a neck and neck battle ensued between **Mya**

McClure and **Matilda Read**, coming down to a final 100m surge from Mya that put her 4 secs clear. Both girls returned fast times, Matilda's being a gold medal winner in a 22 sec PB. It was a happy journey home to Gippsland for the Reads, with younger sister **Pippa** also claiming gold in her first-ever State title race, also with a PB. And a special high-5 to **Caitlyn Shipham** who chose a good day to slash her PB by an imposing 24 secs.

Angus Shuttleworth had his own last lap battle to hold off **Lewis McLennan** in the Boys U15, achieving this with the best of the boys' times on the day. Young **Tate McQueen**, who carried the sport's colours most Saturdays in Bendigo this summer, posted his own good result for gold in the Boys U14 race.

ITALY: Italian Indoor T&F championships, 22/23 February - Ancona

Francesco Fortunato sets new world record in the 5,000-meter short track walk

(reprinted from <u>O Marchador</u> – 24 February)

Italian athlete **Francesco Fortunato**, bronze medallist in the 20km race walk at the last European Athletics Championships (Rome 2024), broke the world record for the 5,000m race walk on a short track during the Italian Championships, which took place last weekend in Ancona, with the race walk events taking place on Saturday (22/02).

Fortunato, 30 years old, passed the first 1,000 meters in 3:39.6, the 2,000m in 7:16.9, the 3,000m in 10:54.0, the 4,000m in 14:26.2 and finished the last kilometer in a very fast 3:29, crossing the finish line in 17:55.65 minutes and improving by 11 seconds the (official) record of 18:07.08 that the Russian Mikhail Schennikov had achieved in the distant year of 1995, in Moscow.

Naturally, the previous transalpine record for the distance was shattered, which belonged to the 2004 Athens Olympic champion, Ivano Brugnetti, with a time of 18:08.86, from 1995.

For Fortunato, "the dream was to beat the Italian record, the real madness was to set a new world record. The great Brugnetti tried, but missed by just one second and today I killed two birds with one stone," said Fortunato, who happily said it was a great moment in his career, having won the mixed relay race (with Trapletti) at the last World Race Walking Team Championships in Antalya, Turkey.

The men's podium at the Italian short track championships was completed by **Gianluca Picchiottino** in second place (18:50.11) and **Riccardo Orsoni** in third place (18:56.55), while in the women's event **Federica Curiazzi** won with a time of 12:17.08, the second world best of the year, behind Portugal's **Vitoria Oliveira** (12:13.39), followed on the podium by **Giada Traina** (12:46.48) and **Sofia Fiorini** (12:50.11), all setting personal bests.

FURTHERMORE ...

• Following on from news posted in Issue #7 regarding **Koki Ikeda's** 4-year suspension following a positive finding of blood irregularities, the Japanese walker's club, Asahi Kasei, issued a further notice on its website on 14 February, in which it stated its position on Ikeda's case:

'No Prohibited Substances on the Prohibited List of the World Anti-Doping Agency have been detected in Ikeda's body.

'The AIU regularly performs blood testing of a small portion of athletes who compete internationally, including Ikeda, to measure haemoglobin values, etc., in order to detect blood doping. Past test results for each athlete are recorded, and when any test result fluctuates beyond a certain limit set individually based on such record, and if it is thought to have been caused by the use of prohibited substances or methods, the athlete is notified and requested to explain how it is not a violation of anti-doping rules. The notification to Ikeda was based on his blood test results from June 2023 indicating haemoglobin values etc. exceeding the limit.

'After receiving the notification in June, Ikeda collected information related to his living habits, training regimen, and physical condition, as well as his blood test data kept by the Japan Institute of Sports Sciences, and requested the assistance of sports medicine physicians who are deeply versed in the field of anti-doping, and other specialist medical researchers.

'The opinion of these experts is that Ikeda's haemoglobin value fluctuation was caused by his training, living environment, physical condition, and side-effects of prescribed medication* which resulted in intravascular haemolysis and gastrointestinal haemorrhage, and was not due to blood doping. Said experts submitted written statements to the AIU describing their opinion.'
